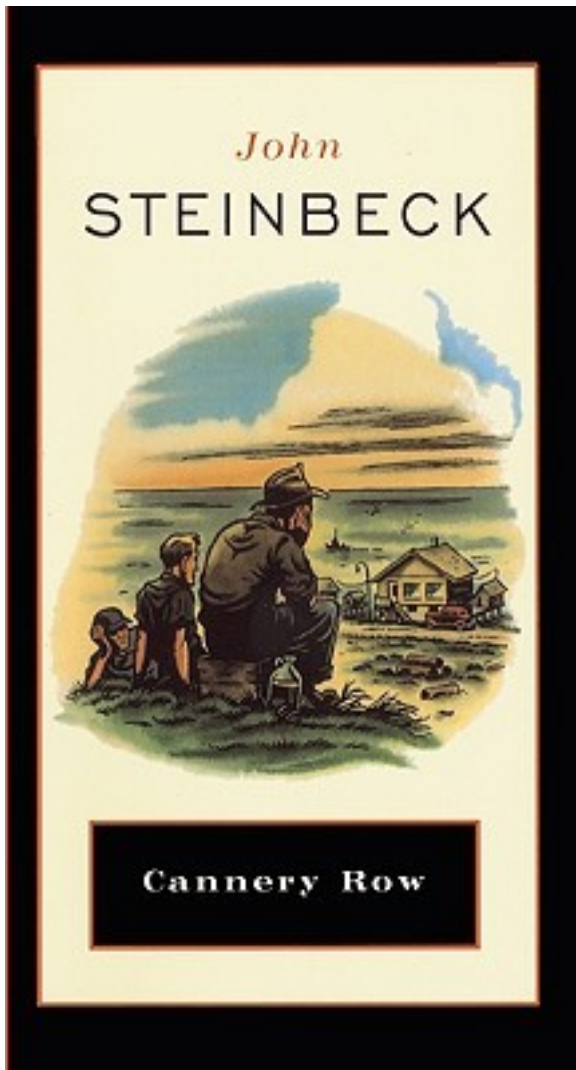

D.R. Haney: Steinbeck is one of those writers I never bothered to read. I'm put off by book titles that allude to the Bible, and I was never wowed by Tom Joad's monologue at the end of the film version of *The Grapes of Wrath*. It was just so damned noble. "I'll be there, Ma." I seriously doubt it.

A few weeks ago, I interviewed a TV actor for a new magazine in New York. He's a nice kid, and during the interview, I asked him to name his favorite writers, and among them was Steinbeck. It was embarrassing to admit, even to myself, that I'd never read Steinbeck. Surely it was time.

Two well-read people I know have cited *Cannery Row* as their favorite Steinbeck, so I bought a copy of it. At first I hated it. "This is the Disney version of poverty," I kept thinking. "The bums, the hookers, the mentally challenged -- they're all good at heart."

Yet, bit by bit, I was won over. I wasn't won over in a dramatic way; I simply allowed that, while there are not and never have been people like the ones in this book (and I stand firm on that point), I can still find them charming. I've certainly been charmed by bums and hookers with hearts of gold in Hollywood movies from the same period -- why can't I do the same with literary characters?

Meanwhile, despite my mistrust of his view of people, I have to admit that Steinbeck is an evocative writer. I can hear the sea. I can smell the grass. I can taste the liquor. That's no small gift, as far as I'm concerned. There are writers I admire far more who don't engage my senses. Also, the story of the gopher -- a parable, really -- at the end of the book was unexpectedly crushing.

cheap whiskey and Model T's were interchangeable. When squatters could make an old cannery their home and when artists could pretend to be French and live in a partially built boat. Why do I wish for this? It's depressing and everything feels soaked in sepia and I see pageboys and horny sailors and dare I say... ruffians? I am messed up.

This is beautiful and sad and romantic and hopeful and tragic and wistful.... and....

Everyone seems to have a favorite story... the gopher, the party, the frog hunt. I can't pinpoint one. I can only describe emotions and even then, I feel like I cheated and was only able to give in to them superficially. It's really hard to take in *"The word is a symbol and a delight which sucks up men and scenes, trees, plants, factories, and Pekinese. Then the Thing becomes the Word and back to Thing again, but warped and woven into a fantastic pattern. The Word sucks up Cannery Row, digests it and spews it out, and the Row has taken the shimmer of the green worlds and the sky-reflecting seas."* while the bus driver is laying on his horn and swerving dangerously around a Subaru.

I love every part of this book. Every word. It conjures up whimsy and makes me feel like there is more to life than vampires and reality shows and twitter and... and....

I also want to give a shout out to the reviews that many of my friends have posted. Each are in itself a chapter, a slice of the Row. I love that [Sarah](#) read this to her friends during a trip from Portland to Salinas. I love that [Ben](#) is reminded of teenage fears that [karen](#) uses the phrase 'well-meaning ineptitude' and that I now have an image of [Logan](#) flirting it up with Steinbeck.

Brad: I find it difficult to remember [Cannery Row](#) after over twenty years distance (I read it in high school, although it wasn't assigned. I enjoyed [Of Mice and Men](#) so much I had to keep reading), but I do envision Mack walking past the sardine factories as vividly as if I read it this morning.

The plot details, the way all the supporting characters linked up, even who Mack and the boys were doing their "thing" for (hell...I can't even remember what "thing" they were doing) are gone. I've lost my access to the details. But there is a feeling, an impression, that has always stuck with me. An impression that Mack and the boys faced life well, a way I'd like face life if I could.

And that feeling has, in turn, tainted many of my experiences with the Beats, especially the characters of [Jack Kerouac](#).

Kerouac is sort of "the King of the Bums," but I think [John Steinbeck](#) bummed him one better with Mack, the original bum.

I'd much rather hang with the easy nature of Mack and the boys than the self-absorption and narcissism of Sal Paradise or Ray Smith -- at least I've felt that way for two decades. And that feeling is often renewed when I think about [Cannery Row](#) or the Beats who followed.

If there weren't so many books I want to read in this life, I'd revisit [Cannery Row](#) and see if my feelings still hold up, but then maybe it's better to just let my feelings be.

I love digging Mack more than his literary offspring, and I'd hate to kill the glow that surrounds what memories I do have of Steinbeck's early 20th century California town.

It's tempting, though...so maybe someday.
