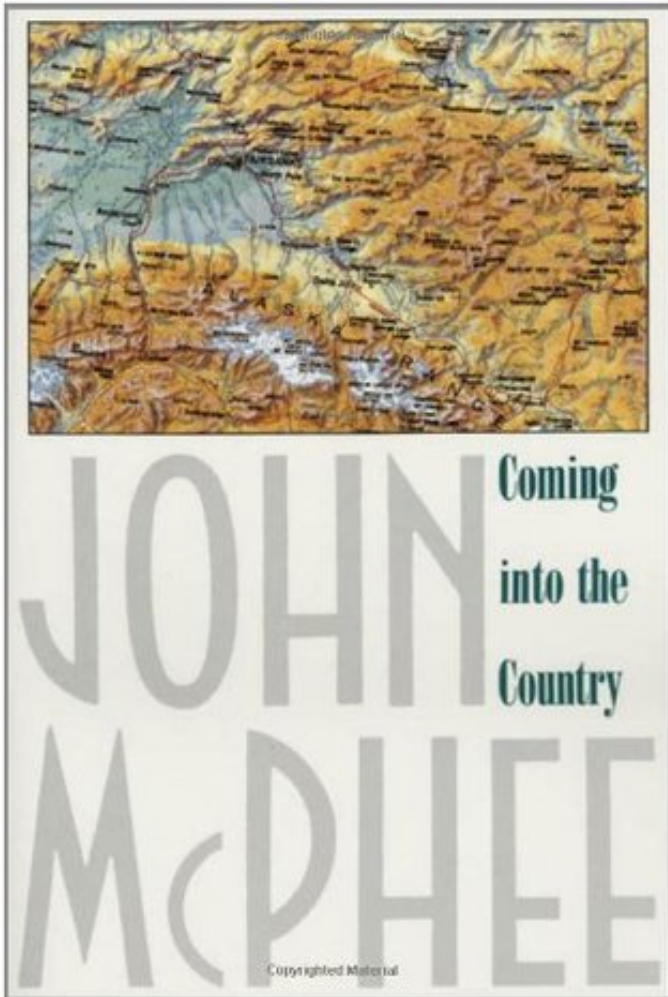

This is the story of Alaska and the Alaskans. Written with a vividness and clarity which shifts scenes frequently, and yet manages to tie the work into a rewarding whole, McPhee segues from the wilderness to life in urban Alaska to the remote bush country.

Tim: Alaska in the mid-70s, examing its wilderness, city and bush in three essays. The first travels with state officials in the northwest along an isolated river. The second, and briefest, especially examines Anchorage and the potential search for a new capital. "Almost all Americans would recognize Anchorage, because Anchorage is that part of any cit where the city has burst its seams and extruded Colonel Sanders." The final and longest essay, for which the book is named, is about Eagle in NE Alaska where the Yukon River enters the state. It allows reflection on the way oil development, the setting aside of land for parks and native peoples, and the history of gold rush and escape to the frontier all mix together in the characters of the place. McPhee makes both the individuals (communities are thin on the ground) and the landscape come alive. And bears. Certainly would not mind an update from today.

Sue: I read this non-fiction book before I went to Alaska in May. It is a very good read - but especially interesting to me because I could picture some of the things McPhee was talking about while I was in Alaska. The book is written in "parts" - the first part was about his travels in Northwest Alaska with a group of environmentalists - about the rivers, salmon, bear, flora, etc. The last part is more about the people who move "into the country". Some were born and raised in Alaska, some were escaping the Lower 48 (for many reasons, not all of them altruistic!), and some who are true native Americans (the local tribes).

I liked this book because it was well written, not too dry, and actually helped me to understand that my view on things (ie hunting) was not necessarily based on having all the facts. I can now understand why a family has to kill one elk a season to provide them with meat for the long winter in Alaska. (I still don't agree with flying in an airplane mowing down wolves - although that is addressed in the book too.)

He attempts to survive \$1,500 a yr (this was once written within the mid seventies); he has a sequence of seize strains and barely makes use of a parka, even at -30'. the nearest city is Eagle, approximately 30 miles away through puppy sled, with a inhabitants of approximately 100. just about all dwell via the ut regulations on code, "Never positioned regulations on any individual.... Up right here they ain't gettin' you for spittin' at the sidewalk."Ironically, so much moved there for the space, but land is much less on hand (as of 1977) than within the decrease '48 simply because whilst Alaska grew to become a nation bargains have been made with the local american citizens and the government to put aside nearly the full country as both a reservation or park land. while sooner than statehood a person may well construct a cabin eighty miles from nowhere, now a central authority helicopter could fly over and throw them out. Homesteading now not exists, yet in Alaska that loss turns out in particular poignant in territory the place you may have to fly someplace to take a shower.

This first and foremost appeared rather interesting, yet finally turns into repetitive because it turns out nearly all of humans dwelling in Eagle are at the very least mildly unhinged, anti-government varieties with serious persecution complexes and a powerful feel of entitlement. McPhee turns out to get

slowed down in telling each tale he encountered in Eagle and, for me, the publication flooring to a repetitive halt. turns out to me that this part might were greater served picking out many of the extra attention-grabbing tales and fleshing them out in detail.
