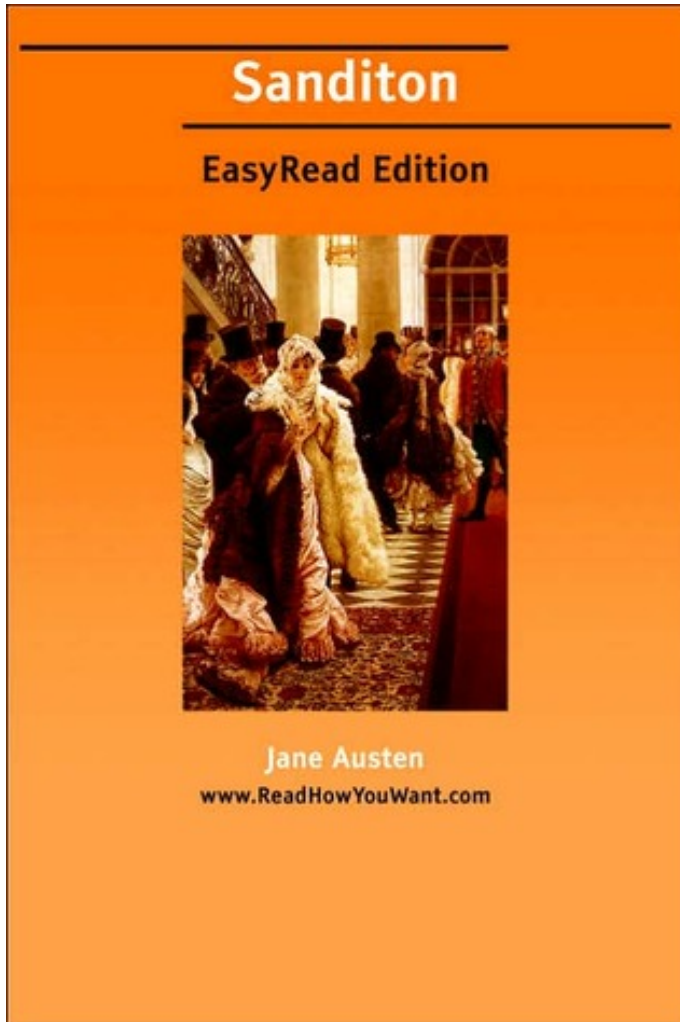

## Insightful reviews

Alana: This was the novel on which Jane Austen was working at the time of her death. It has a delightful opening, introducing us to some intriguing characters. Only about 1/4 of the book was done by Austen, the rest finished by the imagination of a much later authoress. She makes a valiant effort and the story is pleasant enough but it lacks that little bit of spunk and flair that make the rest of Austen's works click. The ending is just not quite believable and that small lack of flair makes it more obvious than usual that it's simply a plot about nothing. There is a complete lack of action in all of Austen's tales, but one doesn't normally FEEL this. A valiant effort, nonetheless.

Susan: I actually read *Sanditon* online. It's only 12 chapters long and it doesn't take long to read at all, more's the pity. It's the start of a lovely novel. The part that Jane Austen finished, before she sickened and died, is utterly charming.

It did not take long to love Charlotte Heywood almost as much as Elizabeth Bennet. Charlotte enjoys laughing at the ridiculousness around her just as much as Lizzy does. Charlotte has plenty of ridiculous to laugh at: There are the Parker siblings, who always think they're at death's door, but really have nothing wrong with them but over-active imaginations and not enough to do. There is also Lady Denham, who will remind one forcibly of Lady Catherine deBourgh; and a Mr. Collins type, in the form of Sir Edward Denham, Lady Denham's nephew by marriage. Sir Edward wants to be fascinating. He reads too many novels. The one follows the other.

I wish Jane had been able to finish *Sanditon*. I know other authors have put their own stamp on what they think would have happened, if Jane had finished it, but I'm sure no one has created exactly what Jane had in mind. The town she created, though, is one that I'd love to live in, just like Cranford.

I've now read a version of *Sanditon* that was "finished" by Another Lady, Marie Dobbs. She did an admirable job of following what Jane Austen started and finishing it in a way that satisfies the Austenites, mostly.

I could tell where Jane's writing stopped and Marie Dobbs's started, but that's to be expected: No one but Jane Austen can really write like Jane Austen. Still, Ms. Dobbs did an admirable job of staying within the language, and the plot that one is certain Jane would have written, herself.

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Ms. Dobbs added only three characters to the ones already introduced by Jane, and she fleshed out the characters Jane introduced in ways that don't jar the senses against what Jane had written.

All in all, it's a satisfying conclusion to the book Jane started. Jane would have written it better, of course, but it's a book one can feel glad to have read.

Emma Petfield: It's a shame that we'll never know the intentions for this book but I'll enjoy coming up with my own ideas and reading other people's interpretations. It was a good set up and the characters had just started to really gain a depth that they were putting to use before Austen unfortunately passed away.

Siria: this is often one of many extra visually fascinating variants of a Jane Austen novel that I own—admittedly I am a bit burdened as to why there's a poultry at the cover, however it is striking. In its material and themes, it feels extra early Victorian than Regency. The eleven chapters are an ideal begin to a novel, sketching out an impoverished heroine, a beach city and its eccentric inhabitants, and hinting at a few intrigue and romance. This description makes it sound like a vintage Jane Austen novel, yet really what stunned me so much was once how this manuscript breaks with the conventions of her six released novels. it really is targeted even more at the social surroundings and the interaction among hearsay and truth than it's at the heroine, who slightly positive factors within the first six chapters. it is interesting to work out how Austen's type endured to boost over her career, correct up till the final months of her life. With each one successive novel she strikes more and more clear of the literary conventions of the romance and deeper into the social satire and observation that's the engine of all her works. Like *Persuasion*, Austen's final accomplished novel, the Sanditon fragment exhibits a complexity and compassion within the satire of secondary characters that is much less obvious in her past works. She left no notes behind, no tricks approximately her intentions, simply eleven ideal chapters, introducing us to the atmosphere and flippantly sketching in an immense forged of characters. She makes strikes in the direction of introducing a romantic hero, yet it truly is simply as most probably another person but to be pointed out used to be meant because the romantic lead. And it is very unlikely to assert what lies in the back of the romantic secret she introduces within the final chapter, even supposing according to Austen's different works, we will make surmises. What we are left with is a delicious, frustrating, attention-grabbing fragment; an unsolvable literary mystery. Sanditon needs to be left to our imaginations and our goals to finish, yet i feel what's right here merits to be learn and mentioned as a part of the Austen canon. i will certainly be revisiting it.
