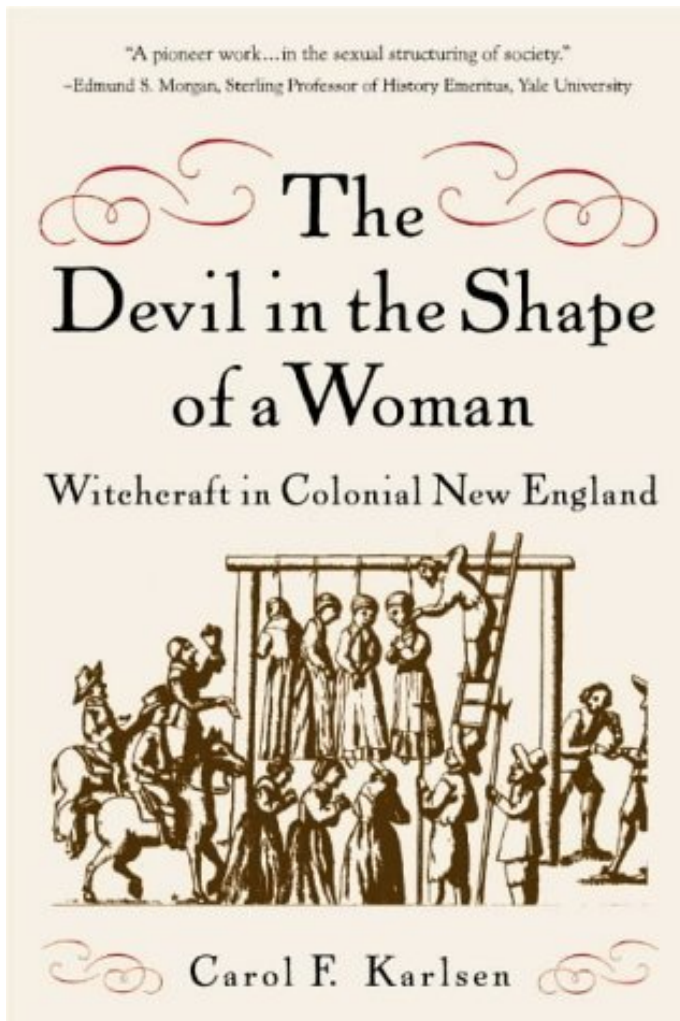

Matthew: This book is about a fascinating topic and covers witchcraft in New England in places and times other than the Salem trials. The writing is a bit textbook-ish at times and tends to rely on a lot of data analysis rather than retelling all of the events in the style of a story. Overall, I would say that this book had great potential, but it is marred by an irritating undertone of feminist scholarship. This tone disappears for the most of the book but is annoyingly obvious in the intro and conclusion. Overall, it is worth a read but could be much better.

Annalisa: Really interesting and readable analysis of the witchcraft craze throughout New England in the mid-to-late 1600s, focusing on the age, marital status, and economic situations of the accused witches. The thrust of Karlsen's main argument is that New England witches were primarily women of middle age, whose husbands were deceased, had abandoned them, or were otherwise away or marginalized; who had no surviving sons and often no brothers, or were not on friendly terms with them; and who had lost and fought over, stood to gain, or already come into possession of a sizable inheritance. Their position therefore was one of a "worthless" member of society, unprotected and unsupported, at a time when many New Englanders were fighting over access to property.

I think that the book's best moments though are in the last chapter, when Karlsen turns her attention to the possessed (or "bewitched"), and how their fits and attacks often displayed an enormous anger and deep-seated resentment at male authority figures. She argues that these girls, many of them servants or orphans sent to live with relatives, in many cases almost certainly did believe they were being possessed by a devil or a witch, and were so disconnected from their internalized frustration and anger at their limited prospects in life that they couldn't express it in a healthy way.

Wives, mothers, and kids weren't resistant to those communal fight opposed to the restrains of society. Karlsen exposes the commercial and social undertones underneath the accusations. Karlsen states that the one such a lot salient attribute of witches was once their sex. "At least 344 people have been accused of witchcraft in New England among 1620 and 1725. Of the 342 who may be pointed out via sex, 267 (78 percent) have been female." (47) girls have been anticipated to be subservient to their husband, but ladies who truly succeeded in operating their husband's enterprise have been prone to accusations of witchcraft simply because they stepped past their gender role. Karlsen narrows down the accused via age, income, and marital status. a number of the ladies accused have been married. usually quarrels one of the husbands boiled over into accusations of the wives. Katherine Harrison was once the spouse of John Harrison, who was once a prosperous landowner. Karlsen states that it's doubtful what occasion bring about Harrison's accusation of being a witch. it's believed that she was once first accused as a witch in 1668, however the jury used to be not able to choose on her guilt. by some means she was once published from legal and again home. Then "several of the town's such a lot favourite citizens" (85) signed a petition testifying to her guilt. one of many petitioners, John Chester, was once "involved in a criminal controversy with Harrison bearing on a parcel of land." (85) Her husband had died in 1666 and left Harrison with a large amount of wealth. Her friends testified that she was once a witch and less than the strain of wasting her lifestyles she distributed her holdings to others. Karlsen states that "most witches in New England have been center elderly or outdated ladies eligible for inheritance simply because that they had no brothers or sons." (117) within the witch stereotype the presence of the normal girl gender position is evident. ladies accused of witchcraft have been defined as "disagreeable women, at top competitive and abrasive, at worst ill-tempered, quarrelsome, and spiteful." (118) those ladies bucked the norms of society and did not adhere to the factors in their class. To the Puritans "gender matters have been spiritual issues" (119) and ladies who deviated from their prescribed function have been visible as being competitors of God's command. This stereotype of the witch stemmed from the generally disbursed *Malleus Maleficarum* and *Tratado de las Supersticiones y Hechicherias*. either works notice that "women have been by means of nature extra evil than men" (155) and that simply because they have been "subject to deeper affections and passions, harbored extra uncontrollable appetites, and have been extra at risk of deception" (155) they switched their allegiance from God to devil to "fulfill their wishes and to supply them with the ability to avenge themselves." (155) yet why may ladies desire avenging

until they have been being encroached upon through unrighteous practices? the reply to this query was once unimportant to the patriarchal society of Europe and New England. yet there isn't any doubt that this query resided within the brain of each accused witch. Karlsen fulfills her function in Satan within the form of a Woman. via supplying money owed of person girls and the level to which they have been accused, Karlsen presents a element look at the underlying purposes in the back of the witch accusations. She indicates to the reader a hidden schedule that reaches a ways past the scope of fine as opposed to evil. The schedule she unearths is a crusade opposed to ladies who have been perched precariously on a tricky stability among their idealized social and fiscal positions.

This used to be the normal and godly order of items and to imagine otherwise, invited envy and malcontent which unavoidably led towards Satan. Inheritance legislation have been different components masked underneath the piety of a witchcraft charge. Farm parcel plenty have been granted to sons as they married, with the most land element being published upon the father's death. Widowed moms have been distributed permission to stay on the major domicile until eventually their very own demise even supposing no adjustments to, or sale of, the land used to be allowed other than notwithstanding granted permission of both the eldest son or the courts. This was once to make sure right passage of estate to the sons. a few exceptions have been even made the place males left their whole holdings to their other halves yet typically, girls weren't landowners.
